Allen has just signed a scholarship to the University of Evansville (Illinois), a minor Division I school after spending the last two years improving his game and his marks at Spoon River Junior College in Canton, Illinois, located about 160 miles southwest of Chicago.



It was McCullum who gave Allen a shot to play in the States after he found out he couldn't play at a major college because of his marks, a rule known as Proposition 48. McCullum blames his coaches and teachers at Morning Star for this.

"Bobby just missed qualifying for division I, but he didn't know the requirements," said McCullum. "If got to be a good basketball player. the coaches up there had an NCAA guide, they'd be able to start telling these kids in Grade 11 or Grade 12 to enjoy Bobby's time at exactly what it's going to take academically to get into the States."
